A Wildlife Garden (Part 2)

By 2008 my garden wasn't

By 2008 my garden wasn't so much a wildlife garden, but a wild one! The grass had to be strimmed as no mower would cope and the very long privet hedge was in dire need of some TLC!

The solution arrived in the sturdy form of John, an old mate of my late husband. He came in the back way through the jungle and said 'This needs some work!' Very much an understatement! He offered to help, although how I wasn't sure: 'Give me a free hand' - and I agreed.

A few days later he turned up with a small JCB. My heart sank at first, but John explained what he intended to do. Practically everything went - a small grove of bird cherry, shrubs, grass, turf, leaving only Kate's garden (one of our Springer Spaniels), a tiered rockery and my lovely buddleia - John would probably have taken that if I hadn't stopped him! He prepared the soil, raking it into a fine tilth and sowed a wild flower mix. I said 'That will be lovely in a few months'. John said 'It doesn't work like that, people think all you have to do is scatter the seed and up it comes. But like all plants, they need to be nurtured and happy, and gardeners need patience.'

At first it was all grass and it did look neat. Slowly different grasses began to appear and I began to count the flower species - first daisies and buttercups, red an white clover, hawkbit and speedwell. In summer 2020 I counted 25 species of wild flowers and grasses. The latest was lesser stitchwort, like tiny stars, probably blown in from the fields at the back.

Now it was up to Michael, my new gardener to care for it, as John returned to other duties.

Is that snow I see? Well, it is Easter, when as boys we traditionally went camping, hoping for fine weather, and ALWAYS ending up getting wet and cold (the trick was to keep some firewood in the tent). Here I am stuck indoors with

an injured foot from too much planting. The unfamiliar restriction and pain serve to remind me of those for whom that is their normal situation. In the meantime the garden

is bursting with life and colour, birds are seeking out nesting bits. My garden, being rather chaotic and mixed up, is a paradise for wildlife, all part of the Grand Plan of course!

The lack of rain means watering pots and newly located plants become even more important. Even when it does rain, don't rely on that alone, keep watering. Now is a good time to sort out your pots of hostas, maybe splitting them or repotting them into larger pots. Time now to deal with vine weevil in heucheras and disporopsis. If you are re-potting or moving them, do check the old soil or compost very thoroughly for the vine weevil grubs.

Being out of action for a while may be a warning of things to come, so now I have enforced time to review what I may not be able to do in the future and look at changes to the garden, before they are forced on me.

Whatever the size of your garden, there is always something to do, even if it is just being part of nature. Speaking of which, have you seen the patch of blue spring squill in Chestnut Copse?

The month of May

Did you know that May is the modern-day English adaptation of the Latin word Maius which goes back to the time of the ancient Greeks who named the month after the Greek goddess of growth? May can be a wonderful month in the garden and in the

countryside with the birds chirping, flowers blooming and blossom on the trees. But if you're on the other side of the world, in the southern hemisphere, then it's a time when summer is long gone and the nights are getting colder and darker. It's a time of change, no matter where in the world you are.

May Day is the first day of May and traditionally a celebration of spring and the resurrection of nature after the winter months. It is normally associated with flowers. dancing and maypoles with celebrations sometimes including the crowning of a May Queen or May King. On May Day, people would traditionally collect flowers, blossom and branches to decorate their homes. Women and girls would rise early and wash their faces in the fresh morning dew, as this was believed to make them radiant, reduce blemishes and attract their future spouse.

The Maypole was the centre of the celebrations and the dancing. Originally, this was a large tree in the forest that was decorated in situ, but later it was cut down and brought to the village (or community) and decorated with flowers, wreaths, handkerchiefs and ribbons. The dance around it was an expression of the joy of new life.

May Day was banned by the Puritans but was reinstated during the Restoration period under Charles II. It was very popular in Victorian times when there was a revival of the adornment and dancing around the Maypole by girls and still continues, albeit in a more limited way, in some parts of the country today.

Walks with a view

Isn't it nice to have a walk with a view? The local walker is very blessed with some special views. If there were prizes awarded for the best local views, which would be on your list? Here is mine:

Views of Hurst Green – the footpath across Tandridge Golf Course, but better still the view from the eastern end of Pastens Lane, which is particularly fine at

Most Unexpected view – the view of Canary Wharf and the City of London from the permissive path behind Chaldons Farm, Gangers Hill.

Finest Bucolic vista – as you emerge from the woods on the footpath from Pastens Lane to Tenchleys Manor.

Houses - Titsey Place from the top path east of Pitchfont Lane. Best of all, the vantage point over Chartwell House from the path in the woods to the west. A world class view.

Greatest variety - Mariner's Hill, where a short level circular stroll encompasses views eastward along the North Downs towards Maidstone, southwards to Tunbridge Wells, Crowborough, Ashdown Forest and then westwards to Gatwick, Leith Hill and the South Downs.

Best spots for sitting and reading with a view - the seat dedicated to Sarah Mackenzie, a short distance north from the Gangers Hill car park, which has a fine view across Marden Park. Even better, the seat as you come out of the woods of Toys Hill on the Greensand Way heading towards Ide Hill.

Best view of our area - the two seats just south of the road at the top of Gangers Hill, near the car park.

Best view of all - westwards from the site of the great house of Weardale on Toys Hill, stretching to the South Downs and the Hampshire border. Truly magnificent at Michael Harman sunset.
